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MANAGEMENT LETTER

September 22, 2021

The Audit Committee, Board of Education, and Management
Akron Central School District

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the remaining fund information of Akron Central School District (the District) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2021, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses. In addition, because of inherent limitations in internal control, including the possibility of management override of controls, misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected by such controls. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

1. <u>Unassigned fund balance over 4%</u>

The unassigned fund balance in the general fund was \$6,276,000 at June 30, 2021 and represents 19.3% of the 2022 budget. As you are aware, the legal limit imposed by the state is 4% of the general fund's budget for year ended 2022.

PRIOR YEAR RECOMMENDATIONS

Included in our current year procedures is an update of the status of recommendations made in previous audits.

We previously noted instances of extraclassroom activity clubs with incomplete data leading to
amounts that did not agree to the central treasurer's records. Students resumed responsibility for
their ledgers in September 2020 and two of the clubs we examined contained minor discrepancies
compared to the central treasurer records. We also noted instances of missing check and receipt
numbers on student ledgers. We encourage the District to provide an annual refresher on proper
accounting of extraclassroom activity funds to the central treasurer, faculty advisors, and student
treasurers.

INFORMATIONAL POINTS

The following points are for informational purposes only and we do not consider it necessary for management to include a response within the District's corrective action plan.

GASB Statement No. 87, *Leases*, was affected by GASB 95 and is now effective for the District's year ending June 30, 2022. This statement requires recognition of certain lease assets and liabilities for leases that were previously classified as operating leases and that recognized income or expenditures, based on the payment provisions of the contract. Under this statement, a lessee is required to recognize a lease as a liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset and a lessor is required to recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources.

GASB Statement No. 96, Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements, is effective for the District's year ending June 30, 2023. This statement generally requires a government to recognize a right-to-use subscription asset and a corresponding subscription liability that is measured at the present value of the subscription payments expected to be paid during the subscription term.

We have discussed these comments with District personnel and would be pleased to discuss them in further detail, perform any additional studies, or assist you in implementing the recommendations.
